GILMAN-DAAD GERMANY SCHOLARSHIP

The U.S. Department of State's Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program is proud to announce a new partnership with the Ger-

man Academic Exchange Service (DAAD). The Gilman-DAAD Germany Scholarship will provide 40 additional scholarships per year for the next three years for exceptional U.S. undergraduate students to study and/or intern for academic credit in Germany. This new partnership represents the largest ever Gilman partnership to support American undergraduate students, who represent the diversity of the United States, to study or intern abroad.

The Gilman Program, funded by the U.S. Government, expands the U.S. population that studies and interns abroad by providing scholarships to approximately 3,000 outstanding U.S. undergraduate students annually who, due to financial constraints, might not otherwise have this opportunity. Since the program's inception, more than 34,000 Gilman Scholars, representing all U.S. states and territories, have studied or interned in over 155 countries around the globe.

The additional funding for the Gilman-DAAD Germany Scholarship supports a wider effort to increase and diversify international student mobility among German and U.S. higher education institutions. Ethan Rosenzweig, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Academic Programs in the Department of State's Education and Cultural Affairs Bureau, said, "We are grateful to the German Academic Exchange Service in partnering with us on the Gilman-DAAD Germany Scholarship as we strive to make international educational experiences more accessible to all U.S. students. Dr. Kai Sicks, Secretary General, German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD), noted, "The Gilman-DAAD Germany Award will provide study abroad opportunities in Germany for American students, who would not have been able to go abroad without this funding. This new cooperation with the U.S. Department of State and the Institute of International Education (IIE) allows us to welcome more students with diverse backgrounds at German universities. It is our hope that these study abroad experiences will lead to a life-long relationship with Germany and its people."

Oldenburg, Indiana, located in Franklin County is truly an historical gem. The town was founded in 1837 as a German Catholic community when Southeastern Indiana was flooded with German-speaking immigrants leaving Cincinnati and the other Ohio River ports searching for fertile farm-

land. Visionary priests serving their immigrant flocks recognized the village as a great center for Catholic religious and education. The numerous ornate spires lining the Oldenburg skyline are proof of the vision and leadership of these clergymen. Fachwerk, limestone, and especially brick are the materials that built this exceptional village in the 19th and early 20th century.

Following keynote presentation, Dr. Giles Hoyt will moderate a panel discussion on Oldenburg, Southeastern Indiana and its German connec-

Amana Colonies by Marcia Gascho

In 2021 we took several road trips and visited some cities founded by Germans. I have already written about our visit to New Ulm, Minnesota and Frankenmuth, Michigan. Last spring we were both fully vaxxed and decided to drive to Iowa to visit the Amana Colonies.

A religious group was called the Community of Inspiration in 18th century Germany. They suffered from persecution for their beliefs and moved around Germany. A man named Christian Metz led a group of Inspirationists to the US in 1843-44. The members purchased 5000 acres near Buffalo, New York. Their group of 1200 people led a communal way of life. Their community was called the Ebenezer Society and had a formal constitution. When they needed more farmland, they looked west and found a valley on the Iowa River. They arrived in 1855, calling the area "Amana" which means "remain true" from the Song of Solomon. They founded six villages--Amana, East Amana, West Amana, South Amana, High Amana and Middle Amana. In 1861 the village of Homestead was added which gave them access to the railroad.

Their communal way of life continued in Iowa with all residents receiving housing, medical care, and schooling for the children. Each person was assigned a job and received no wages. Women of the community operated over 50 communal kitchens that provided three meals a day. Many of the villages also had a smokehouse, bakery, icehouse, orchard and vineyards. The Amanas became known for the high quality of their wood working and cloth making. In 1932 during the Depression, the communal way of life ended. The Amana Society was established to become a profit-sharing corporation to manage the farmland, mills and other businesses.

The Amana Colonies were declared a National Historic Landmark in 1965 and attract many visitors every year. You can still see the historic brick, stone and clapboard houses. There is one remaining Communal Kitchen in Middle Amana where visitors can learn about communal dining and eat a special meal April-September with reservations. In the village of

Amana, the Amana Heritage Museum is well worth a visit. In Homestead, there is an Amana Community Church Museum. There are usually a number of festivals in Amana like Winterfest, Maifest, Wurst Fest, Oktoberfest and Christmas events. Unfortunately, many were canceled in 2020 due to the pandemic. They resumed some festivals in 2021. They have scheduled many festivals for 2022.

We started our visit at the Amana Visitor Center in the village of Amana. They provided us with maps and other information. We drove and strolled around Amana and visited some of the shops. We enjoyed watching craftsmen make furniture in a woodworking shop. There are several

German restaurants in the area. We ate dinner at the Ox Yoke Inn. We stayed in Homestead at Die Heimat Country Inn Bed and Breakfast where we enjoyed an awesome breakfast with socially distanced seating. We visited all the remaining Amana villages during our stay. The

quaint General Store in High Amana retains its 19th century feel.

Some people confuse the Amana colonies with the Amish. They both began as movements in Germany but the Amana Church broke away from the Lutheran church. The Amana colonies embrace innovation and new technology. The Amana brand of appliances was started in 1934 by George Foerstner in Middle Amana. The company developed many innovative products like side-by-side refrigerators, self-defrosting freezers, consumer microwaves (Radar range) and clothes dryers with a stainless-steel drum. Maytag bought the Middle Amana plant in 2001 which was then acquired by Whirlpool in 2006. You can still find appliances with the Amana name.

Check out the Amana colonies the next time you pass through Iowa. It is located not far from I -80 northwest of Iowa City.

AROUND THE STATE

INDIANAPOLIS:

Indianapolis – Cologne Committee president, Melissa Hopson, reported on some of the ambitious German-themed plans in the works for 2022.

First off, in partnership the Indianapolis-Cologne Sister City Committee, the Freundeskreis Köln-Indianapolis e.V. and Amerika Haus NRW e.V. the Sister City Film Exchange will premier the award winning documentary *Night School* (2016) in Cologne on April 19th. *Night School* is about three Indianapolis students determined to graduate from their high school despite the fact that the institution has one of the lowest graduation rates in the country.

In June, Milky Chance, a German rock

band originating in Kassel, will appear at the WonderRoad music festival in Garfield Park. *Milky Chance* incorporates elements of



folk, reggae, and jazz into their music.

UPDATE ON THE GERMAN NEWSPAPERS MARKER



Casey Pfeiffer, from the Indiana Historical Bureau, reported that they had received the funding from the City of Indianapolis to replace the missing German Newspapers' Demise marker, and a replacement marker was ordered late

last year. The Bureau took advantage of this accidental "redo" to correct a minor grammatical issue in the text.

The Department of Public Works is still working on the construction on South Delaware Street and is likely to be working there for some time to come. For that reason, the replacement marker will be shipped to the Historical Bureau

and safely stored there until the site is ready in the spring. At that time the city will get it reinstalled.

Meanwhile, the our marker is safe and sound and waiting to be reinstalled.

This will be a "Prep for the Fest" event. StrassenVORfest will help usher in the 2022 Strassenfest which will be held in Jasper on August 4 to August 7.



46TH ANNUAL SGAS SYMPOSIUM

Muss i denn (Must I, then)

Muss i denn is a popular German folk song, usually sung in the Swabian dialect. The song is about a journeyman embarking to his traditional "Wanderjahr" journey, where he has to leave the woman he loves and vows to remain faithful until he comes back to marry her.

The present form dates back to 1827, when it was written and performed by Friedrich Silcher. The origin of the song, however, is obscure and the original text was not recorded. Silcher mentioned that the melody was "an old melody from Württemberg".

The song became famous during the 19th century. It was especially popular among the German military, and excursion groups, who considered it a patriotic song. It also became popular among German merchant seamen as a capstan shanty.

Some versions were widely popularized in the 20th century, including interpretations by German-American actress Marlene Dietrich and by Greek singer Nana Mouskouri.

The melody and some of its verses became famous worldwide in 1960 when the tune was

adapted into an English song titled "Wooden Heart" by Elvis Presley. Thanks to this versionand another version by Joe Dowell, *Muss i den* becoming one of the most widely known German songs ever.

After the Second World War, Huntsville, AL suddenly had a lively German community of intellectuals. The German colonists were there as a result of the U.S. War Department's Operation Paperclip. This operation recruited Wernher von Braun and a large number of his team who had successfully developed the world's first super sonic rocket, the V-2, in the last phases of the war. The colony in Alabama became the core of NASA and led to the U.S. winning the space race with Man on the Moon in 1969 as President promised in 1961.
