

This individual/organization/group must be or have been active in the German-American Community over a period of time. The award granted to a Hoosier individual, organization or group must have demonstrated ongoing dedication to promoting and perpetuating German culture. The award will be presented in the fall of each calendar year.

From Indiana University Honors Program for Foreign Language (IUHPFL) IGHS scholarship recipient Jack Szuba,"This past summer, I completed the IUHPFL in Graz, Austria. The program was nearly 5 weeks long with various classes and activities performed exclusively in German. There were three main subjects; a Grammar class, a Linguistics class, and an Austrian Culture and Literature class. I particularly enjoyed the Culture portion of the classes, as I found it extremely interesting to learn about both the history and culture of the country I was studying in. For the duration of the program, students stayed with a host family. I was lucky enough to receive an extraordinarily nice host family who made my trip even better. 2023 National Turner Festival By Marcia Gascho

The 56th American Turners National Festival was held in New Ulm, Minnesota, on July 25-29 2023. Typically the Fests are held every four years. The last one was held in Fort Wayne, Indiana, in 2019. Indianapolis hosted a large Turnfest in 1905 with thousands of Turners participating from the US, Germany and Italy.

In 2021 my husband and I stopped in New Ulm, Minnesota. We met Andrea Boettger, the director of the Turner Hall there and got a tour of the building. She came to Indy later and visited our Athenaeum. In 2021 she put in a bid to host the 2023 National Turnfest in New Ulm for the first time and they were selected. This summer we took a trip through Minnesota and stopped by New Ulm the day before the events started. We watched various Turner clubs arrive and pick up their packets at registration in the Turner Hall. There was a display of art work, scrapbooks, quilts and Turner memorabilia in the gym. I spoke to an 80 year old guy named Bill Woehrle who had attended the Normal College at the Athenaeum in the 1970s. He became a Turner instructor in New Ulm and other cities. He had several tables full of interesting scrapbooks and other items from his days at the Normal College and of his various activities with Turners over the years. I could have talked to him for hours. He was competing in a number of events that week. When we last visited the New Ulm Turner Hall, their Rathskeller was

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Indianapolis in the late 1950s. He worked with his uncle Karl Klemm and later with Otto Straub at Klemm's meats, perfecting the butchering and sausage making trades during this time. In 1969, Gerhard bought the business outright and rebranded it as Klemm's German Sausage and Meats, selling out of Indianapolis City Market before moving to the South St. in Indy. Gerhard and his wife Evelyn ran Klemm's German Sausage and Meats until retiring in 2003, at which time he sold his business to his nephew Claus Muth, who moved the business to the now famous Shelby St. location. Claus operates the Indy institution with his wife Karen, to this day. The Klemm name is synonymous with German meats in Central Indiana, being the primary supplier to area restaurants, all major German-themed festivals, and educational and charity functions.

Gerhard's contributions to the Indiana German-American community are immeasurable. He has been an active leader and board member in the Indianapolis Liederkranz since moving to Indiana, and was an active member of the Indianapolis Sängerchor. He was an original member of the Athenaeum Foundation during its modern inception in 1991, and a founding member of the German-American Klub of Indianapolis in 1974, and has been a member of the Indiana German Heritage Society since its founding. Gerhard and Evelyn have also been critical supporters of Christel House, providing food and education to vulnerable populations in the area, and other charities that have been critical to Indiana."

burg. The exhibit is in the form of a Wegweiser/direction sign as found throughout the Germanspeaking landscape of Europe. Berne in Adams Co. is named for the city/canton in Switzerland. The directional sign is accompanied by a text board and maps locating the corresponding places in Europe and Indiana. Wegweiser started the year in the Rotunda of the Indiana Statehouse. In February through May it was in German classrooms of Roncalli and Perry Meridian high schools. Allen County Public Library hosted the exhibit June-August where it was in the famous genealogy library there. It was featured during the international German genealogy conference in June in Fort Wayne.

In September the Michigan Road Public Library in Indianapolis hosted it and it was also featured in the Indianapolis-Köln Partner Cities fund-raising party It will be featured at the Athenaeum Germanfest on 7 October and then from October to late November in the Marian University Therese Hackelmeier Library. Marian was founded by the Order of St. Francis of Oldenburg, Indiana. During the Athenaeum Christkindl Market in November-December, the exhibit will be centered in the Marktplatz in the Athenaeum Biergarten. Plans are in the works for the exhibit to return to the Indiana Statehouse for the month of January.

closed. This time we were able to eat dinner there. They have wonderful paintings of German castles on the walls.

I asked Andrea some questions about hosting the Turnfest.

How many different Turner clubs participated? How many total participants were there? We had representation from 23 different Turner Societies from across the United States, and close to 450 participants registered. There are 49 Turner Societies remaining in the United States, so to get nearly 50% to participate and come to New Ulm was fantastic! New Ulm Turner Hall is the only remaining society in Minnesota. Many of the other societies participating came from Missouri, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Pennyslvania, Kentucky, New York and more!

What training did you have to prepare for hosting the Fest? We had very little training, but a great track record of prior festivals and notes to use. My goal was to have this be the "Best Fest" ever. I was very mindful when putting together our steering committee. Our planning committee was comprised of the School Superintendent, the Head of the New Ulm Park & Recreation Department, The Mayor, The Chamber President, The President of Schell's Brewery, the prior Mayor, the City Manager and many other high level leaders who dedicates so much of their time and talents to make the event a success! I was so lucky to have them all sign on to do this, and it was a commitment of over TWO YEARS, with the last 60 days ahead of the festival being the most demanding. Everyone did an incredible job and I could not be more proud of this committee for helping to put on an incredible five-day event!

What were the challenges you faced planning and hosting the Fest? We were the most nervous about the lodging with so many people coming to

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town. But our committee stepped up and put together a great list of options for our visitors to stay. In addition to our local hotels, our visitors also stayed at the campgrounds at Flandrau State Park in New Ulm, Oakwood Campground, and at a variety of our local short term rental homes and apartments. Another challenge was finding volunteers. It truly takes a village to put on an event like this, and we secured over 125 volunteers, many of whom worked multiple shifts at various locations. We are so lucky to have such an engaged community who really embraced this festival and wanted to be a part of the action, even if they weren't participating in the competitions events. We hosted a variety of events that included: gymnastics, pickleball, volleyball, track and field, 5K run/walk, swimming, model drill, mass drill, and a cultural competition that contained over 65 categories. Everything from vocal and instrumental performances, photographs, quilting, and even Legos! Some of the entries were pretty incredible!

The Turnfest also featured a parade, a beer garden, live music and an awards banquet with German singing. Congratulations to Andrea and New Ulm for hosting a successful Turnfest this year.



This September, IGBC visited Chicago to meet with the newly appointed Consul Generals of Germany and Switzerland. Indiana is home 121 German companies and 58 Swiss companies.

Michael Ahrens took up his position as Consul General of Germany in Chicago in August 2023. Before arriving in Chicago he served as Minister Counselor for Security and Defense Policy at the German Embassy in Washington, DC. Prior to that he was the Deputy Head of Division for Humanitarian Assistance at the Federal Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Berlin from 2015 to 2019.

Pascal Bornoz was appointed Consul General of Switzerland in Chicago this Summer. Mr. Bornoz previously served as Consul General of Switzerland in Lyon, France from 2019 to 2023. Prior to his appointment in France, Mr. Bornoz served as Regional Coordinator for the Middle East from 2014 to 2016 and as Deputy Regional Coordinator for North Africa from 2011 to 2014.




SO, WHO WAS MAX KADE ANYWAY? By Nichole Neumann

Max Kade (1882 – 1967) was a successful pharmaceutical entrepreneur and philanthropist. Born in Steinbach, Germany (near Schwäbisch Hall) in 1882, he immigrated to New York in 1905 and founded a pharmaceutical company through which he built his fortune.

In 1944, Max Kade and his wife Annette Marie Baudais, set up the Max Kade Foundation to help victims of World War II and to save and preserve works of art and other German cultural artifacts.

The Foundation continues to support initiatives that promote and encourage German Studies and exchange between German-speaking countries and the United States such as post-doctoral research exchange programs, visiting faculty exchange programs, and exchange programs of undergraduate and graduate students both here and abroad.





Indiana Historical Marker Lost Again!

Once again the Indiana Historical Bureau marker recalling Indiana's long history of German Language Newspapers has been damaged. In September Bill Selm's sharp-eyed exchange student spotted that the Newspaper Marker on south Delaware street he had visited a couple a weeks before, was no longer there. That marker was already a replacement for the original market, which had been installed by the city on October 17, 2022 after the original one was damaged during road construction in the area. The IGHS Preservation Committee is working with local police and the Indiana Historical Bureau. A police report has been filed, but as of this writing, no culprit has been identified.


